# **ENERGY AND CLIENT SERVICES**

We offer a variety of services and resources to the community, as well as numerous services to assist those in housing crisis to obtain and maintain stable housing.

The Hillside Foundation, of the Hillside decking, ensuring seniors had safe and Retirement Community in McMinnville, reliable transportation and providing utility provides YCAP with funds to supplement our services for our elderly clients. We rely on these funds to help achieve safely and securely. Client Services served

important work in our Client Services Department as well as our Energy and Weatherization Department. With a mission to support the elderly in financial crisis, Hillside Foundation is truly a gift to have available when needs arise. We are deeply appreciative for the longtime committment of the Foundation.

This past year our Energy Department served 28 households, fixing water leaks in roofs, stabilizing unsafe outdoor stairs in the homes of disabled seniors, repairing

decking, ensuring seniors had safe and reliable transportation and providing utility bill assistance. All of these actions allow for our senior clients to live in their homes safely and securely. Client Services served 31 persons through the Elderly Assistance Fund, with one third of requests preventing utility shut-offs and another third assisting seniors in maintaining safe and reliable transportation to remain mobile and active in the community.

We are so grateful to be able to provide these services to seniors in our communities because of the Hillside Foundation.

### FEED HOPE HOLIDAY CAMPAIGN

These amazing students raised a record setting \$10,371.51 and 6,903 lbs of food!

### YOUTH SERVICES: POSITIVE YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

We believe that a community's youth is one of its most valuable resources. We believe communities benefit by ensuring all of its young people are provided with the basic opportunities or essential services that can support them in developing a sense of competence, usefulness, belonging, and empowerment.

Positive Youth Development (PYD) is a framework that guides communities in the way they organize services, opportunities, and supports so that young people can develop to their full potential. PYD is not just another program at Youth Outreach. It's an approach in which we emphasize the following:

--We focus on strengths and positive outcomes. Rather than taking a deficitbased approach, we develop effective strategies, intentionally helping young

--We encourage youth voice and engagement. Youth are valued partners here at Youth Outreach with meaningful, decision-making roles in their own goals and services.

--We promote community involvement and collaboration. We understand that youth themselves can play an important role in making the community a great place to live.

At Youth Outreach, we've made a longterm commitment to our young people
